The locally approved amendment to the Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan (Plan Amendment) received by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) on April 7, 2015, is hereby approved.

The Plan Amendment makes the following changes:

Adds language that specifically states: "All disposal areas besides Transfer Facilities are deemed inconsistent with the Plan."

Adds a siting review procedure for Transfer Facilities found on page III-30 which includes the following:

1. The proposed facility must be located on a Class A, All-Season Road, with the Facility access directly from the Class A All-Season Roadway.
2. The facility must meet all applicable state and local laws, zoning and ordinances in effect at the time of application.

See Page III-7, the facility description of Whitefeather Landfill. This landfill has 4,175,153 yards of capacity or 18.8 years of capacity alone. Bay County requires 120,968 tons of disposal capacity, or roughly 352,904 cubic yards per year. This is 11.5 years, assuming that all Bay County Waste is disposed of in this landfill. The County has access to at least 5 other landfills, totaling 24,543,741 cubic yards of capacity or an additional 203 years of capacity.

SITING REVIEW PROCEDURES, Authorized Disposal Area Types

All disposal areas besides Transfer Facilities are deemed inconsistent with the Plan.

SITING REVIEW PROCEDURES, Siting Criteria and Process

Siting for Criteria for Transfer Facilities:

1. The proposed facility must be located on a Class A, All-Season Road, with the Facility access directly from the Class A All-Season Roadway; if an additional access approach is proposed for the location, the entire access route to the facility must be upgraded and approved to meet Bay County Road Commission and/or MDOT standards for Class A, All-Season Road by the Facility Owner/Developer expense, prior to any waste being received at the facility.
2. The Facility must meet all applicable state and local laws, zoning and ordinances in effect at the time of application.

Documentation for an amendment to the Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan (Plan Amendment) was received by the Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) on April 8, 2002.

Based on the information submitted and after further discussions with management staff of the Waste Management Division (WMD), the DEQ has determined that the Plan Amendment was not prepared in accordance with Part 115, Solid Waste Management, of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, 1994 PA 451, as amended, and the Part 115 Administrative Rules. Specifically, the 67 percent local municipality approval was received prior to the public comment period and public hearing. It is the DEQ's determination that the Plan Amendment must receive at least 67 percent local municipality approval after the public comment period and public hearing have been completed. By this letter, the DEQ is providing the County with the opportunity to withdraw the proposed Plan Amendment. If the County does not choose to withdraw the Plan Amendment before August 5, 2002, the WMD staff will recommend the Director disapprove the Plan Amendment as submitted.

During your June 21, 2002 conversation with Ms. Lynn Dumroese, DEQ, WMD, you asked for specific statutory references to support the DEQ's decision. The DEQ has made this determination based on the following requirements of Part 115. Section 11533(2) of Part 115 states an amendment to a Plan shall be prepared and approved as provided in section 11533, 11534, 11535, 11536, 11537, and 11537a. Section 11534 discusses the requirement for appointing a Planning Committee to prepare a County Solid Waste Management Plan (Plan) and states the members of the Planning Committee shall be appointed every two years. The documentation provided for the Plan Amendment indicates the members of the Planning Committee were contacted for their input and none objected to the proposed Plan Amendment; therefore, the County proceeded with the Plan Amendment. Section 11535 then describes the requirement of the proposed Plan to be made available for a period of not less than three months to the DEQ, to each municipality within the affected county, and to adjacent counties and municipalities that may be affected by the Plan or that have requested the opportunity to review the Plan. Section 11535 further states the comments received during the comment period shall then be submitted to the County Board of Commissioners (BOC) and a public hearing shall be conducted before formal adoption. Following the sequential order of events, Section 11536(2) describes the next step in the approval process, which states the BOC shall formally act on the plan following the public hearing. Section 11536(4) then requires the Plan to be approved by the governing bodies of not less than 67 percent of the municipalities.

The Part 115 Administrative Rules further support the DEQ's determination. Rule 709(4) reaffirms an Amendment of the Plan shall follow the same procedures for review and adoption as the original Plan and the updates. Rule 707 discusses the first steps of the approval

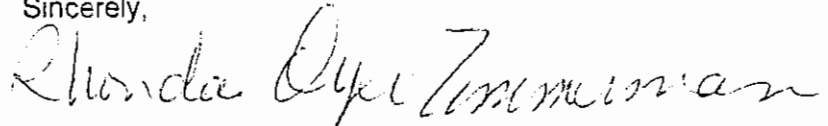
process, which include having the proposed Plan made available for a review period of not less than three months and the requirement to have a public hearing conducted before formal adoption by the County, the municipalities, or the state. Rule 707 then states after the public hearing, the Designated Planning Agency shall make any revisions to the Plan, in response to the public comment period and shall submit the Plan to the Planning Committee. As previously mentioned, the County took responsibility for preparing the Plan Amendment and therefore, took responsibility for making any revisions to the Plan Amendment in response to the public comment period. Rule 707 also clarifies that formal action by the BOC must come after the public comment period. It appears the BOC did not make any changes to the Plan Amendment and took formal action to approve the Plan Amendment on March 12, 2002. Rule 708 describes the last step in the approval process, which includes the requirement of the Plan to be approved by no less than 67 percent of the municipalities in the County before being submitted to the Director for approval.

The DEQ has consistently applied this approval process for previous amendments to County Solid Waste Management Plans. Further, the DEQ believes Part 115 and the Part 115 Administrative Rules clearly indicate that the 67 percent local municipality approval must occur after formal action by the BOC and the BOC cannot formally act on the Plan Amendment until the public comment period and public hearing have been completed.

As previously mentioned, the DEQ has determined that the Plan Amendment was not prepared in accordance with Part 115 and the Part 115 Administrative Rules. The County must now have the local municipalities act on the Plan Amendment and receive at least 67 percent municipality approval. As previously mentioned, if the County does not withdraw the Plan Amendment before August 5, 2002, the WMD staff will recommend the Director disapprove the Plan Amendment as submitted.

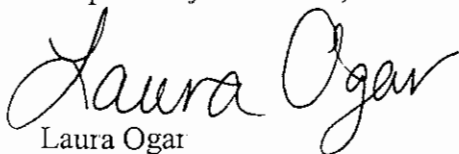
Laura Ogar noted that this amendment requires a 90 day public comment period for which we are closing-in on that time-frame. This is the Public Hearing as required for this amendment. She stated this amendment had already been distributed to the local units for their consideration. It was passed with over two-thirds voting in favor of the amendment. She stated the purpose of this meeting today was to hear public comments. She asked if anyone wished to speak and stated the comments will be transcribed and responded to if requested.

Don Wagner, Plant Manager at the General Motors Powertrain, Bay City Plant:

“As you described, the General Motors Powertrain Bay City Plant requested a review and modification of the Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan to allow importation and exportation of industrial waste with Shiawassee County. This modification will enhance the Bay City Plant’s manufacturing competitiveness. General Motors implemented an internal waste disposal program to improve their handling of the solid waste while also reducing costs. The internal program consists of limiting the number of industrial waste landfills the corporation uses nationally and incorporating every U.S. GM facility into this program, including our Plant here in Bay City. The landfill in Shiawassee County is the closest licensed industrial waste plant landfill of the six that are included in General Motors’ national internal waste disposal program. The Bay City Powertrain Plant is currently incurring considerable transportation costs by shipping industrial waste to the next closest industrial landfill included in the General Motors program, which is in Northwood, Ohio, 158 miles away. This issue is unique to the Powertrain Bay City Plant because other Michigan counties in which GM facilities are located already have an importation/exportation agreement with Shiawassee County. Modifying the Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan will enable the Bay City Powertrain Plant to continue to operate with competitive costs so that it can maintain its role as a valuable member of the community.”

As there were no other public comments made, the Public Hearing adjourned at approximately 7:30 p.m.

The Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) received the locally approved update to the Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan (Plan) on April 2, 2001.

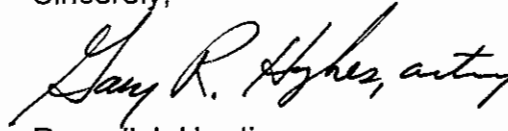
By this letter, this Plan is hereby approved. The DEQ would like to thank Bay County (County) for its efforts in addressing the County's solid waste management issues.

By approving the Plan, the DEQ has determined that it complies with the provisions of Part 115, Solid Waste Management, of the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, 1994 PA 451, as amended, and the Part 115 administrative rules concerning the required content of solid waste management plans. Specifically, the DEQ has determined that the Plan identifies the enforceable mechanisms that authorize the state, a county, a municipality, or a person to take legal action to guarantee compliance with the Plan, as required by Part 115. The Plan is enforceable, however, only to the extent that these enforceable mechanisms are properly implemented under applicable enabling legislation. The Plan itself does not serve as such underlying enabling authority, and the DEQ approval of the Plan neither restricts nor expands the County authority to implement these enforceable mechanisms.

The Plan may also contain other provisions that are neither required nor expressly authorized for inclusion in a solid waste management plan. The DEQ approval of the Plan does not extend to any such provisions. Under Part 115, the DEQ has no statutory authority to determine whether such provisions have any force or effect.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Bay County is a primarily rural county outside of the City of Bay City. The solid waste management system has evolved through a combination of needs, cost effectiveness and long effort by public and private groups to maximize resource recovery in the waste stream.

The County is not developing at a rate that demands wide scale waste handling planning, nor is it expected to do so in the next five to ten years. Most development is in new and existing residential subdivisions, with very little industrial or commercial group that would alter the waste stream in quantity or type of waste.

Given this situation, Bay County has chosen to retain the current solid waste collection and disposal system currently in place, with several changes to increase public awareness and opportunity to recycle and remove hazardous materials from the waste stream.

The County reviewed four main solid waste management alternatives prior to coming to this conclusion. These alternatives are to,

1. Retain the solid waste management system as it currently exists.
2. Adopt a combination of two approaches. First we would recommend maintaining the current system of solid waste hauling and disposal efforts and institute additional efforts at diverting recyclable and reusable materials from the waste stream through three methods. This alternative stresses increasing public awareness of recycling, reuse and composting alternatives, identifying households in a more consistent manner to improve the efficiency of the current waste hauling system and decreasing open burning. This is the selected solid waste management system.
3. The third alternative is to encourage the municipalities that have not already done so to institute curbside disposal through special assessment and possibly include curbside recycling if their community is not sparsely populated.
4. The fourth alternative is to maintain the current solid waste collection system but require co-collection of trash and recyclables for all household that subscribe to trash collection. In addition, the alternative establishes recycling drop-off locations in every township at least twice a month.

CONCLUSIONS AND SELECTED ALTERNATIVE

The manner of evaluation and ranking of each alternative is very simplistic. The cost and potential for waste diversion are the two main factors used to evaluate each method. We did not rank the alternatives since there appears to be only one logical choice in this rural and sparsely populated county. Of the four alternatives, only one shows the opportunity to divert a substantial amount from the waste stream at a reasonable cost and that is the second alternative.

INTRODUCTION

GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

To comply with Part 115 and its requirements, each Plan must be directed toward goals and objectives based on the purposes stated in Part 115, Sections 11538 (1)(a), 11541 (4) and the State Solid Waste Policy adopted pursuant to this Section, and Administrative Rules 711(b)(I) and (ii). At a minimum, the goals must reflect two major purposes of Solid Waste Management Plans:

- (1) To utilize to the maximum extent possible the resources available in Michigan's solid waste stream through source reduction, source separation, and other means of resource recovery and;
- (2) To prevent adverse effects on the public health and the environment resulting from improper solid waste collection, transportation, processing, or disposal, so as to protect the quality of the air, the land, and ground and surface waters.

This Solid Waste Management Plan works toward the following goals through actions designed to meet the objectives described under the respective goals which they support:

Goal 1: To utilize to the maximum extent possible the resources available in Michigan's solid waste stream through source reduction, source separation, and other means of resource recovery.

Objective (1a): Increase drop off locations for recycling all materials, specifically oil and those items currently collected at curbside for those areas with curbside programs.

Objective (1b): Provide positive reinforcement for major industrial, municipal and commercial recyclers through awards and publicity.

Objective (1c): Increase household hazardous waste collections.

Objective (1d): Reach a 30% diversion rate for recyclables within the next five years.

Objective (1e): Encourage recovery of recyclables by industrial, commercial and residential sources.

Objective (1f): Produce local TV and radio ads on public cable channels on recycling education.

Objective (1g): Establish a recycling information packet encouraging people to buy recycled products, using examples of products, for distribution in public locations to newcomers and other groups.

Objective (1h): Encourage municipalities and organizations to locate a drop off center for returnable bottles and cans.

Goal 2: To prevent adverse effects on the public health and the environment resulting from improper solid waste collection, transportation, processing, or disposal, to protect the quality of the air, the land, and ground and surface waters.

Objective (2a): Increase enforcement of open dumping offenses.

Objective (2c): Continue inspection and sampling of landfills and surrounding water sources at the state and Township level.

Goal 3: Develop an integrated solid waste management system in which all components work together effectively and efficiently.

Objective (3a): Ensure that the system maximizes proven waste reduction methods such as recycling and composting and extends the life of existing and planned landfills.

Objective (3b): Set up a cooperative network between the government and the waste industry.

Objective (3c): Encourage all waste haulers to include recycling in the services that they offer with waste pick up.

Objective (3d): Encourage waste collectors to introduce incentives using contractual agreements for participation in curbside recycling.

Goal 4: Minimize the costs and impacts of dealing with each component of the solid waste stream.

Objective (4a): Address issues relating to the siting and management of landfills and handling of materials which must be disposed of in this manner.

Objective (4b): Prevent adverse effects on public health and on the environment resulting from improper solid waste collection, transportation, processing, and disposal, including protection of surface and groundwater quality, air quality, and the land.

Goal 5: Develop an efficient, environmentally sound and cost effective solid waste management system that is capable of meeting the County's diverse needs for the next 20 years.

Objective (5a): Encourage new and innovative materials and energy recovery technologies.

Objective (5b): Advocate a more inclusive returnable bottle law.

Objective (5c): Promote lobbying on solid waste issues through the Michigan Township Association, Michigan Municipal League, Michigan Association of Counties and other organizations.

Objectives (5d): All solid waste disposal methods for type II and type III wastes other than land filling must be expressly allowed in the Solid Waste Management Plan by amendment.

All figures reported to Bay County were in cubic yards from both disposers and haulers. We used the conversion rates of three cubic yards equals one ton for all types of waste except soils. One cubic yard of soil, including foundry sand is assumed to weigh one ton. These conversion rates are those used by the local landfills. The industrial waste conversion rate is supplied by Consumer's Energy, for which .972 tons equals one cubic yard.

Household solid waste figures were derived using both actual figures reported to the county by waste haulers and disposers and checked against standardized solid waste generation rates for rural and urban areas from the Environmental Protection Agency's Waste Characterization study for 1995 and the National Solid Waste Management Association's Technical reports.

The EPA indicates that waste is generated at the rate of 4.5 pounds per day per person. The NSWMA establishes a range of 2.5 to 3.5 pounds per day per person. In the absence of any other available information such as a waste characterization survey, we have elected to use the NSWMA figure as a guide and comparison to what we learned through contact with haulers and generators. Other industry standards estimate one ton of waste per household per year is reasonable.

There are 110,423 people in Bay county, according to the Michigan Information Center's 1997 estimates. Population figures for municipalities are from the 1990 U.S. Census STF 1A Summary Tapes. This equates to 60,457 tons of household waste generated per year in Bay County, which is significantly lower than that reported by haulers and disposers. We have elected to use the rates reported by haulers and disposers.

for commercial waste generated without a waste survey. We checked generation rates against those determined from a survey of commercial generation in Saginaw County, an abutting, somewhat more urban county. These figures show an average of 8.7 pounds per day per employee, based on 310 days per year. The resulting figure is significantly higher than that reported in Bay County by haulers and we have elected to stay with the tonnage reported by haulers.

Industrial waste presents the same difficulty as commercial wastes, although, major industrial generators are easier to identify. In Bay County the major industrial generator is Consumers Energy. Consumer's disposes of all their wastes in private landfills, as substantiated by their submitted disposal reports.

Industrial sludges were estimated as the sole source of data, based on similar generation rates in similarly developed counties.

Municipal sludges are generated by the City of Bay City and the City of Essexville. Currently, Bay City disposes of their sludges and grit from the wastewater treatment plant at the Saginaw Valley Landfill in Saginaw. The City of Essexville sends their sludges to Orion, Michigan for disposal. The City plans to land apply their sludges in the future. These figures were obtained directly from City records.

Construction/demolition debris is estimated from actual figures reported by landfills.

Foundry sand is estimated from actual figures reported by landfills.

Five and ten year estimates were derived by inflating household, commercial and municipal sludge figures by 3% for each five year increment. Population is expected to increase by 3% over each of these increments. Industrial waste, industrial sludge and foundry sand were not inflated since there is no way to predict these figures accurately.

Whitefeather Landfill, 2401 Whitefeather Road, Pinconning, Michigan

This landfill is located in Pinconning Township, Bay County. The landfill is owned by Republic Services of Michigan, Inc. Whitefeather is 106 acres in size. Currently 70.5 of these are permitted for disposal. The landfill accepts residential, commercial, industrial, construction, demolition, contaminated soils, special wastes and asbestos. The landfill has an estimated remaining life of 28.93 years or 5,453,901 cubic yards.

Taymouth Landfill, 4532 East Rathbun Road, Birch Run, Michigan

This landfill is closed.

Peoples Landfill, 4146 East Rathbun Road, Birch Run, Michigan

This landfill is located in Taymouth Township, Saginaw County. The landfill is owned by Waste Management, Inc. Peoples Landfill is 163 acres in size, 29 of which are permitted for disposal. The landfill accepts residential, commercial, industrial, construction, demolition, contaminated soils, special wastes, asbestos, sludges and ash. The landfill has an estimated remaining life of 20 years or 5,301,641 cubic yards.

Saginaw Valley Landfill, 2145 South Miller Road, Saginaw, Michigan

This landfill is closed.

Northern Oaks Landfill, Clare County

This landfill is located outside of Harrison in Clare County. The landfill is owned by Waste Management of Michigan, Inc. Northern Oaks is 480 acres in size, 76 of which are sited for use. The landfill accepts residential, commercial, industrial, construction and demolition, contaminated soils and special wastes. There is an estimated 37.6 years remaining lifetime for this landfill.

City of Midland Landfill, 4315 East Ashman Road, Midland, Michigan

This landfill is located in the City of Midland, Midland County. The landfill is owned by the city for the exclusive use of county residents. This landfill would only be available for use in emergency conditions. The landfill is 400 acres in size, 110 of which are permitted for use. The landfill accepts residential, commercial, industrial, construction, demolition, contaminated soils, special wastes, asbestos, sludges and ash. The landfill has an estimated remaining life of 55 years.

Brent Run Landfill, Genesee County

LAND DEVELOPMENT

The following describes current and projected land development patterns, as related to the Selected Solid Waste Management System, for the next five and ten year periods and a description of the current and projected centers of solid waste generation, including industrial waste for 5 and 10 year periods.

Land development in Bay County is occurring primarily in the southeastern portions of the county. Home building is the primary form of development, with large increases in structures and structural value in Frankenlust, Monitor Williams and Bangor Townships. Development is steady along the water front, again, mostly single family housing for year-round living. Bay City is not experiencing growth in terms of changes to land use; however, existing land uses are fairly stable, as is the population. **These areas are the current and are likely to be the future centers for solid waste generation by residences.**

The northern portion of the county is primarily rural land. There are large tracts of wooded areas and heavy concentrations of farms in each township. I-75 bisects the county from north to south and there is some development along the highway in service businesses and related commercial activity.

Solid Waste planning is not heavily influenced by the development patterns in Bay County. Most new residential structures will be served by municipal waste hauling contracts that include curbside collection of all materials. Existing development is more likely to dictate the needs of residents for opportunities for recycling, for example.

There are two major generators of industrial waste in Bay County. These are Consumer's Energy and General Motors related facilities. **These areas are the current and are likely to be the future centers for solid waste generation by industry.**

Five and ten year projections are shown on page II-1.

SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT ALTERNATIVES (attach additional pages as necessary)

The following briefly describes all solid waste management systems considered by the County and how each alternative will meet the needs of the County. The manner of evaluation and ranking of each alternative is also described. Details regarding the Selected Alternatives are located in the following section. Details regarding each non-selected alternative are located in Appendix B.

Waste reduction, pollution prevention, resource conservation, resource recovery, volume reduction, sanitary landfilling, collection processes, transportation, ultimate disposal area uses, institutional arrangements and recycling and composting programs were discussed as they do or do not exist now for each alternative. These factors were used to rank each alternative, although a formal ranking system was not used. Bay County does not require a formal or complicated ranking or evaluation system due to the largely rural nature, well operating systems for waste management and highly successful waste reduction, composting and recycling programs in the population centers and some rural areas. The County did, however, review each of these solid waste management components when considering each alternative.

We have identified four main solid waste management alternatives.

The first is the solid waste management system as it currently exists and operates.

The second solid waste management alternative is a combination of two approaches. First we would recommend maintaining the current system of solid waste hauling and disposal efforts, as they are operating well and can expand easily to cover households that currently do not contract for hauling services. Changes in this system that we recommend include additional efforts at diverting recyclable and reusable materials from the waste stream through three main methods:

- Establish more frequent and diverse household hazardous collection programs. These need to be well publicized and include a variety of household items. These should be located throughout the county as well and be on a staggered schedule.
- Yard waste and composting options should be better publicized, and expanded where possible.
- Commercial and industrial diversion is going very well. Successful efforts should be advertised and used as examples for other commercial operations where applicable.

This alternative stresses increasing public awareness of recycling, reuse and composting alternatives, identifying households in a more consistent manner to improve the efficiency of the

current waste hauling system and decreasing open burning. This is the selected solid waste management system.

The third alternative is to encourage the municipalities that have not already done so to institute curbside disposal through special assessment and possibly include curbside recycling if their community is not sparsely populated.

The purpose of this alternative is to ensure that everyone has the opportunity to dispose of waste properly and with the least amount of effort. The negative aspects of this alternative are that curbside collection is not the most efficient nor cost effective way to eliminate open burning and promote recycling. This is a rural area with long distances between stops in some locations. Curbside collection on a county-wide basis does not make sense. While we do not recommend this alternative due to its expense and element of overkill for a predominately rural area, we include it in the plan to show that the County has considered all alternatives.

The fourth alternative is to maintain the current solid waste collection system but encourage co-collection of trash and recyclables for all household that subscribe to trash collection. In addition, the alternative establishes recycling drop-off locations in every township at least twice a month. This alternative provides an easy way for household who have waste collection to begin recycling and for those who do not have trash collection, give them an easier opportunity to recycle closer to home. The negatives of this alternative are increased costs to those with household pick-up and increased cost to each Township to provide recycling drop-off service. We do not recommend this alternative due to costs and the potential of repeating a service already offered through recycling drop-offs. Drop-off locations are provided at a fairly regular interval in good locations in the County now, but do require the participant to know the schedule and location of the recycling drop-off and drive several miles out of their way to use this service.

The manner of evaluation and ranking of each alternative is very simplistic. The cost and potential for waste diversion are the two main factors used to evaluate each method. We did not rank the alternatives since there appears to be only one logical choice in this primarily rural and sparsely populated county. Of the four alternatives, only one shows the opportunity to divert a substantial amount from the waste stream at a reasonable cost and that is the second alternative.

THE SELECTED SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

The Selected Solid Waste Management System (Selected System) is a comprehensive approach to managing the County's solid waste and recoverable materials. The Selected System addresses the generation, transfer and disposal of the County's solid waste. It aims to reduce the amount of solid waste sent for final disposal by volume reduction techniques and by various resource conservation and resource recovery programs. It also addresses collection processes and transportation needs that provide the most cost effective, efficient service. Proposed disposal areas, locations and capacity to accept solid waste are identified as well as program management, funding and enforcement roles for local agencies. Detailed information on recycling programs, evaluation and coordination of the Selected System is included in Appendix B. Following is an overall description of the Selected System:

The selected solid waste management alternative is a combination of two approaches. First we would recommend maintaining the current system of solid waste hauling and disposal efforts, as they are operating well and can expand easily to cover households that currently do not contract for hauling services. Changes in this system that we recommend include additional efforts at diverting recyclable and reusable materials from the waste stream through three main methods:

- Establish more frequent and diverse household hazardous collection programs. These need to be well publicized and include a variety of household items. These should be located throughout the county as well and be on a staggered schedule.
- Yard waste and composting options should be better publicized, and expanded where possible.
- Commercial and industrial diversion is going very well. Successful efforts should be advertised and used as examples for other commercial operations where applicable.

This alternative stresses increasing public awareness of recycling, reuse and composting alternatives, identifying households in a more consistent manner to improve the efficiency of the current waste hauling system and decreasing open burning.

SOLID WASTE COLLECTION SERVICES AND TRANSPORTATION:

The following describes the solid waste collection services and transportation infrastructure which will be utilized within the County to collect and transport solid waste.

Solid waste is collected and transported by primarily one hauler in Bay County, City Environmental Services. The selected system expects this hauler to remain the primary hauler for the anticipated future. Haulers and services are based on municipal contracts and/or individual contracts, negotiated on a municipal level. Future services and arrangements cannot be predicted.

RESOURCE CONSERVATION EFFORTS:

The following describes the selected system's proposed conservation efforts to reduce the amount of solid waste generated throughout the County. The annual amount of solid waste currently or proposed to be diverted from landfills and incinerators is estimated for each effort to be used, if possible. We do not know what types and/or volumes of recyclable material are available in the waste stream. A waste characterization study has not been done for Bay County; however, we can make estimates using national averages for rural areas. Using these figures, we estimate a theoretical amount of the following types and amount of materials are available. These figures assume a overall waste generation rate of 3 pounds per person per day. These figures do not take into account any industrial or commercial waste generation or recycling, as this is done outside of the management of the planning agency and overall goals of the county for solid waste handling.

Recycling opportunities are planned to be increased, but these locations and equipment used will be selected by the Townships and Cities involved and the waste hauler with whom the contract is signed.

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COORDINATION EFFORTS:

Solid Waste Management Plans need to be developed and implemented with due regard for both local conditions and the state and federal regulatory framework for protecting public health and the quality of the air, water, and land. The following states the ways in which coordination will be achieved to minimize potential conflicts with other programs and, if possible, to enhance those programs.

It may be necessary to enter into various types of agreements between public and private sectors to be able to implement the various components of this solid waste management system. The known existing arrangements are described below which are considered necessary to successfully implement this system within the County. In addition, proposed arrangements are recommended which address any discrepancies that the existing arrangements may have created or overlooked. Since arrangements may exist between two or more private parties that are not public knowledge, this section may not be comprehensive of all the arrangements within the County. Additionally, it may be necessary to cancel or enter into new or revised arrangements as conditions change during the planning period. The entities responsible for developing, approving, and enforcing these arrangements are also noted.

Several coordination efforts are planned for the selected solid waste management system. These include regionally based recycling opportunities through drop-off sites and soliciting a heavy metal collection contractor. This coordination will take place among townships and cities, encouraged by the County.

Townships and cities may also coordinate contracting efforts in areas where the population base can support a trash and/or recycling collection contract, even when it crosses township boundaries.

Educational programs will be coordinated county-wide through a proposed school program. Other educational efforts are planned through public television and radio.

EVALUATION SUMMARY OF THE SELECTED SYSTEM:

The solid waste management system has been evaluated for anticipated positive and negative impacts on the public health, economics, environmental conditions, siting considerations, existing disposal areas, energy consumption and production which would occur as a result of implementing this Selected System. In addition, the Selected System was evaluated to determine if it would be technically and economically feasible, whether the public would accept this Selected System, and the effectiveness of the educational and informational programs. Impacts to the resource recovery programs created by the solid waste collection system, local support groups, institutional arrangements, and the population in the County in addition to market availability for the collected materials and the transportation network were also considered. Impediments to implementing the solid waste management system are identified and proposed activities which will help overcome those problems are also addressed to assure successful programs. The Selected System was also evaluated as to how it relates to the Michigan Solid Waste Policy's goals. The following summarizes the findings of this evaluation and the basis for selecting this system:

Waste reduction, pollution prevention, resource conservation, resource recovery, volume reduction, sanitary landfilling, collection processes, transportation, ultimate disposal area uses, institutional arrangements and recycling and composting programs were discussed as they do or do not exist now for each alternative. These factors were used to rank each alternative, although a formal ranking system was not used. Bay County does not require a formal or complicated ranking or evaluation system due to the largely rural nature, well operating systems for waste management and highly successful waste reduction, composting and recycling programs in the population centers and some rural areas. The County did, however, review each of these solid waste management components when considering each alternative.

The selected solid waste management alternative is a combination of two approaches. First we would recommend maintaining the current system of solid waste hauling and disposal efforts, as they are operating well and can expand easily to cover households that currently do not contract for hauling services. Changes in this system that we recommend include additional efforts at diverting recyclable and reusable materials from the waste stream through three main methods:

- Establish more frequent and diverse household hazardous collection programs. These need to be well publicized and include a variety of household items. These should be located throughout the county as well and be on a staggered schedule.
- Yard waste and composting options should be better publicized, and expanded where possible.
- Commercial and industrial diversion is going very well. Successful efforts should be advertised and used as examples for other commercial operations where applicable.

This alternative stresses increasing public awareness of recycling, reuse and composting alternatives, identifying households in a more consistent manner to improve the efficiency of the current waste hauling system and decreasing open burning. This is the selected solid waste management system.

ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES OF THE SELECTED SYSTEM:

Each solid waste management system has pros and cons relating to its implementation within the County. Following is an outline of the major advantages and disadvantages for this Selected System.

ADVANTAGES:

1. This system is easy to use.
2. There is well over sufficient landfill capacity.
3. There is public acceptance.
4. People can reasonably be expected to adhere to the selected system.
5. No significant changes.
6. Economically feasible.
7. No siting considerations.

DISADVANTAGES:

1. Still some trash burning by residents.

SYSTEMS

Before selecting the solid waste management system contained within this Plan update, the County developed and considered other alternative systems. The details of the non-selected systems are available for review in the County's repository. The following section provides a brief description of these non-selected systems and an explanation why they were not selected. Complete one evaluation summary for each non-selected alternative system.

SYSTEM COMPONENTS:

The following briefly describes the various components of the non-selected system.

RESOURCE CONSERVATION EFFORTS:

No alternative systems were identified.

VOLUME REDUCTION TECHNIQUES:

No alternative systems were identified.

RESOURCE RECOVERY PROGRAMS:

A curb side pick up was discussed for each Bay County resident. All newspaper, plastics and metals would be set out monthly at the curb and a selected hauler would pick up all materials. In Bay County this was deemed ineffective due to the sparse distribution of residents in the rural areas.

COLLECTION PROCESSES:

TRANSPORTATION:

No change from the selected system.

DISPOSAL AREAS:

With an existing landfill within the County it did not make sense to look elsewhere within the County for a new waste facility. There is ample landfill space in the counties named in the Plan to handle Bay County's waste for the next 10 years and beyond.

INSTITUTIONAL ARRANGEMENTS:

There are no institutional arrangements that we know of.

EDUCATIONAL AND INFORMATIONAL PROGRAMS:

Currently and in each of the nonselected systems, there were no educational or informational programs specified.

CAPITAL, OPERATIONAL, AND MAINTENANCE COSTS:

No costs have been estimated because all contracts and decisions are made at the local level and the nonselected systems were unreasonably expensive.

EVALUATION SUMMARY OF NON-SELECTED SYSTEM:

The non-selected system was evaluated to determine its potential of impacting human health, economics, environmental, transportation, siting and energy resources of the County. In addition, it was reviewed for technical feasibility, and whether it would have public support. Following is a brief summary of that evaluation along with an explanation why this system was not chosen to be implemented.

The nonselected systems were largely evaluated as inefficient and unreasonably expensive for the anticipated increase in recycling or volume reduction. As a rural, sparsely populated county, both the selected and nonselected systems are simplistic and straightforward. They are directed more by the private sector than public and the waste collection, transport and disposal systems operates most efficiently this way.

ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES OF THE NON-SELECTED SYSTEM:

Each solid waste management system has pros and cons relating to its implementation within the County. Following is a summary of the major advantages and disadvantages for this non-selected system.

ADVANTAGES:

1. Single source hauling is easy to work with.
2. Curbside recycling to every resident would produce greater participation.
3. Increase recycling participation.

DISADVANTAGES:

1. Curbside recycling to all residents too expensive.
2. Decrease in waste generation and disposal is minimal from this system.

PUBLIC PARTICIPATION AND APPROVAL

The following summarizes the processes which were used in the development and local approval of the Plan including a summary of public participation in those processes, documentation of each of the required approval steps, and a description of the appointment of the solid waste management planning committee along with the members of that committee.

PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT PROCESS: A description of the process used, including dates of public meetings, copies of public notices, documentation of approval from solid waste planning committee, County board of commissioners, and municipalities.

The Solid Waste Planning Committee members were appointed at a meeting of the Bay County Board of Commissioners, held on April 14, 1998. The Solid Waste Planning Committee approved the draft plan at a meeting held on January 7, 1999. a copy of the public notice of each Solid Waste Planning Committee meeting is included. PLANNING COMMITTEE APPOINTMENT PROCEDURE:

The Solid Waste Committee appointments were made by the Bay County Board of Commissioners.

Members of the solid waste industry were solicited by letter from the chair of the Bay County Board of Commissioners on December 18, 1997. They were selected to represent each waste industry operating in the county. Members of industrial waste generators were solicited by letter from the chair as well on December 18, 1997. The representative of an industrial waste generator was chosen from the top three waste generators in the county. Environmental interest groups, the regional planning agency, the township representative and the city representative were solicited in a similar manner by letter dated December 18, 1997.

Members of the general public were solicited through an ad in the Bay City Times. The representative from County government was selected by the Board of Commissioners as the commissioner in whose district the landfill resides

Each of the reporting municipalities indicated that they are not having major goals for changing their solid waste programs over the next 10-20 years, but they are interested in the possibility of a regional coordinated efforts for managing contracts. Also in common with the reporting municipalities is that they all have recycling programs and continue to look at new recycling opportunities.

It was agreed by the committee to send another letter to the municipalities that have not responded to the initial request for solid waste information, with an October 15, 1998 deadline for a response. The letter will emphasize the need for their input especially since several new issues have been brought up by other respondents.

These issues include:

- Banning incineration
- Designating routes for haulers
- Reciprocal Agreements - Currently Bay County has reciprocal agreements with 12 other counties, but only has signed agreements with 3 counties.
- Landfill citing criteria

Mary Kusterer moved with support from Carl Reinke to receive the correspondence from the above listed organizations and municipalities. Motion carried.

Valerie stated that the committee is still on schedule and an updated Solid Waste draft plan should be ready by the September 24, 1998 meeting. The committee is in the information collection period, and a consultant will be available soon to start preparing the draft.

Tuscola County

Richard Byrne stated that Bay County could option out of paying for updates, but then the Department of Environmental Quality would then come in and update the Solid Waste plan for you.

Public Input

Joe Rivet, who delivered Bangor Township's solid waste information, attended the meeting. He reported that Bangor is in the process of contracting with City Environmental for the next three 3 years to haul their solid waste. It would have been his recommendation to go with the Saginaw County Solid Waste Authority since they had the lowest price, but there were several minor differences in services. Unlimited bundled brush, large household items, tires and wheels are picked up by City Environmental and this was found to be important to the residents of Bangor.

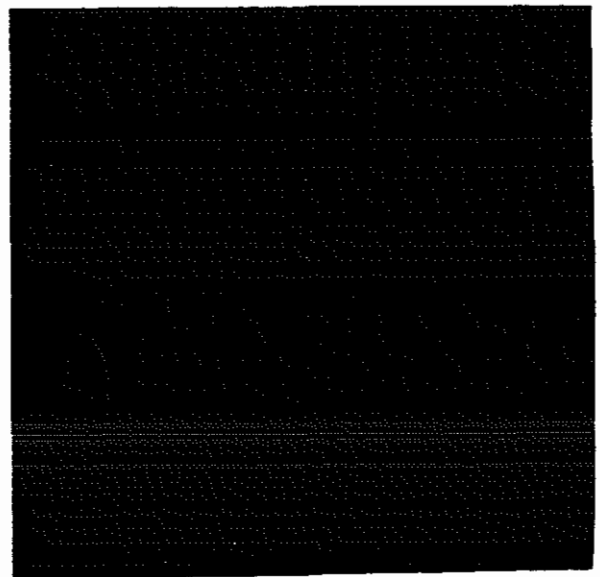

3. Plan Update

Cindy Winland distributed copies of the proposed Work Plan she had prepared for the SWUC which follows the MDEQ guidelines for Plan preparation. Cindy presented her background and experience with solid waste planning and management to the committee.

Cindy reviewed the Work Plan which shows that some steps have been completed by the SWMP Committee. Approximately 1/3 of the database (compiling of information) has been completed.

Valerie reviewed the information presented in the Work Plan with comments from Cindy Winland. MDEQ requirements were discussed as well as the software format.

Auburn, Essexville, Bangor, Bay City, Frankenlust, Pinconning Township, have responded to requests for information. Consumers Power and Lone Tree council have also provided input. These municipalities were thanked. Other municipalities have been contacted again for this information.

Cindy discussed the possibility of whether or not siting criteria are a step that this committee wants to address. It is not required due to the extended landfill capacity at Whitefeather, and there will be substantial time that would need to be devoted to this.

Discussion of siting procedures followed, and some options were discussed and reviewed. Siting procedures for this format are only for a landfill as required by MDEQ. Incineration banning was discussed and Cindy indicated that if we state only landfills and ban incineration then incineration siting criteria do not have to be addressed in this update process. Cindy will contact the MDEQ to ensure that this is accurate. It was noted that Saginaw County has recommended banning incineration in their current update process.

Some discussion of November and December meeting times was discussed as the 4th Thursday of these months fall on holidays. More frequent meetings were discussed. Cindy stated that approximately 7 meetings will be needed to complete the process, barring any complications. Cindy asked that as the committee meets please call ahead with questions. The next meeting was scheduled for October 8, 1998 at 3:00 PM. Be ready to ask questions on information sent out with agendas so that at the meeting time will be productive. Much of the information in the format is repeated from county to county state wide and we can receive this for our plan, is desired, and focus on local issues.

The committee was asked to respond in round table discussion to questions regarding goals and objectives for the update, by Cindy.

- Do we want to ban incineration? To be discussed.
- Recyclables and solid waste are all trucked. Bay City, Hampton Township and Monitor Township all have curbside pickup. Monitor Township has one contract for composting/recyclable and solid waste.

Cindy asked the group to address deficiencies and problems.

- Need composting facilities
- Need clear market for recycled goods, this is 100% market driven
- Solid Waste recyclables are, the committee believes, all hauled to Saginaw at this time for Bay County.
- Can we try to eliminate the need for land filling recycled goods by educational processes.
- Scrap tires are collected by Mosquito Control
- Household hazardous waste is limited by Dow Chemical's restrictions, more information is needed from Bay County's Public Health Department. This is not a critical/severe issue
- Open burning
- Open dumping is a problem, along shore lines, some municipal contracting has helped to reduce this problem, as have trash cans at drive-through fast food windows.
- Some discussion of used white goods (steel, appliances)
- Nickel, cadmium, mercury, A/C and refrigerator units as well as other appliance disposal issues (i.e. batteries) were discussed, more public education was mentioned as a way to address this.

Cindy asked the group to list complaints. None were raised.

Cindy asked the group to discuss goals.

- Not keep all waste in Bay County?

The draft plan also included data base information regarding the current annual volume of solid waste produced according to waste types (household, industrial, etc) and projection for the amount of waste produced 5 and 10 years from now needs to be calculated. Also included in the draft is a list of landfills with descriptions

Bob Hill - Bay County Environmental Health Director: Bob discussed that presently used oil recycling is available at both Valvoline and Pennzoil locations. They accept clean used motor oil in a limit of five gallon quantities. Interstate Battery accepts used motorcycle, automotive, and marine type batteries for recycling. Presently there is not a location around for dry cell or mercury battery recycling. Batteries cannot be accepted through the Bay County household waste program since everything accepted is incinerated at Dow, and batteries cannot be incinerate batteries.

Page 34 - WHITEFEATHER LANDFILL: Changed total number of facility property acres from 106 acres to 752 acres

Page 43 - RESOURCE CONSERVATION EFFORTS: There was discussion regarding what percentage of Bay County's present and projected solid waste is recycled. Cindy presented 2,206 tons/year is recovered in curbside pick up and 450 tons/year in composting

Page 43 - RESOURCE CONSERVATION EFFORTS: The tonnage of present waste diverted from the landfills was obtained from the City of Bay City by Cindy Winland. She added a 10% increase to estimate the amount diverted for the next 5 and 10 years.

Page 44 - Cindy Winland stated that (Tons X 4.5 = Yards) Cindy was not sure if the State will let us list composting/recycling in this section, but we will leave it for now

Page 54 - **PROJECT DIVERSION RATES:** Cindy Winland extrapolated the Bay County numbers from the Saginaw County numbers

Page 60 - The last paragraph in #3 should be changed to read "Bay County may enact an ordinance to establish a tipping fee on solid waste disposed of in Bay County for the purposes of implementing and operating the responsibilities of the Designated Planning Agency as **appointed by the Bay County Board of Commissioners**, including but not limited to all aspect of the Solid Waste Management Plan "

Change the next paragraph to read "Allowable areas of **township, city, and county** regulation include:"

Page 66 - The fourth paragraph will be changed to read "Township and cities may also coordinate contracting efforts in areas where the population base can support a trash and/or recycling collection contract, even when it crosses township boundaries

Approval of Minutes - Meeting minutes from the December 17, 1999 meeting were approved.

Plan Format - Cindy Winland led discussion of the Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan update final draft. Review and comments regarding corrections to the draft followed. Several minor typographical errors were noted.

Page A-6 was amended so that the chart on the lower right-hand corner reads "Designated Planning agency, working with local environmental organizations. . . ." rather than "Local environment organizations. . . ."

A change was made on page III-32 under "Educational and Informational Programs:" to insert the same language from A-6 referenced above in place of Intermediate School Districts.

Mary Kusterer raised issue of municipal ordinance powers to regulate a landfill (page III-33) A Township could enact an ordinance to regulate hauling of solid waste without reference to the plan because the plan does not speak to hauling, only landfills.

Discussion followed on Part 3 of page III-33. This selection requires that a list of landfill operation aspects that could be regulated by a local unit of government be listed.

The language says:

"Bay County may enact an ordinance. . ." Dale Johnson's request is to delete any reference to something that "may" happen. It was noted that these must be listed in order for an ordinance to be able to be enacted.

Dale objected to suggestions that may regulate the industry, and therefore, raise costs for the industry to do business. These costs will be passed along to the consumers.

Any ordinances would have to be implemented through a standard hearing process like any other ordinance, and these types of issues would be discussed at that time. The plan makes it possible to consider future regulations. Dale wanted to cap and restrict any possible tipping fees in the plan or delete the reference entirely. Cindy stated that restrictions on tipping fees cannot be done in the plan.

A motion was made by Dale Johnson to delete , with support from Larry Fairchild. A roll call vote was taken: Byrne - no, Reinke - no, Boies - no, Johnson - yes, Barber - no, Short - yes, Fairchild - yes, Golson - yes, Kusterer - no. Five no; four yes, motion did not carry.

Plan Approval - A motion to approve the plan with the corrections made during today's meeting was made by Kim Short, with support from Larry Fairchild. A roll call vote was taken: all present voted yes, with the exception of Sue Boies, who voted no. Motion to approve was passed.

Roundtable Discussion

Commissioner Byrne led discussion of scheduling the public comment period and public hearing. Time is needed to revise the plan, prepare the minutes and prepare public notices. It was decided that public comment will begin on January 25, 1999, for a period of ninety days as required. A public hearing was scheduled, to be held immediately following Board Committee meetings, at 6:00 p.m. on Tuesday, March 2nd in the Bay County Building. Commissioner Byrne requested that committee members attend the hearing.

Once public comment is closed, a decision will be made as to whether the committee must meet again to make any revisions prior to further review by the local municipalities. The final draft will be mailed to all interested parties, neighboring counties, the state, required agencies and municipalities at the start of public comment. Cindy Winland will coordinate the legal notices on behalf of the county.

Public Input - two media representatives were present; however, no other members of the public were in attendance. No public input was received.

Meeting Adjourned - Larry Fairchild moved to end the meeting with support from Carl Reinke. The motion carried. The meeting was adjourned at 4:35 p.m.

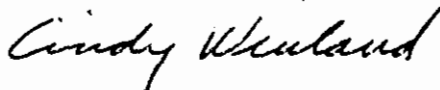

SUMMARY OF THE BAY COUNTY SOLID WASTE PLAN UPDATE, 1998 DRAFT DOCUMENT

All counties in Michigan are required to update their Solid Waste Management Plan every ten years. This public hearing is to gather comments from the public regarding Bay County's Draft Solid Waste Management Plan Update document.

The purpose of updating a Solid Waste Plan is first to ensure that the county has adequate capacity identified to dispose of the waste generated in the county for the next ten years. The secondary purpose of the Plan Update is to outline a solid waste management system that the county has identified as the most efficient way to dispose of solid waste. This system must include a plan for transportation, disposal and funding of solid waste disposal. Some counties take an active role in solid waste management. Some choose to let the municipalities in the County make their own solid waste hauling and disposal decisions.

With this Plan draft, the Solid Waste Plan Update Committee has recommended that Bay County has chosen to leave the decision making power for solid waste handling at the local level where possible. The County has reserved the right to enact ordinances to regulate solid waste and to collect a fee from the waste companies that operate in the county to carry out aspects of an ordinance should one ever be enacted.

The primary differences between this Plan and the previous Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan, approved in 1990 are,

1. This Plan does not recommend additional landfill space be constructed. There is an excess of landfill space in Michigan and adequate space in Bay County for all of Bay County's needs for more than ten years.
2. Given there is adequate capacity for Bay County's solid waste identified in the Plan, this Plan does not include siting criteria for a new landfill in Bay County.
3. Recycling and composting efforts recommended in the 1990 Plan have been exceeded. This Plan notes that recycling and composting are taking place at a desirable level and with an efficient system. No aggressive recycling recommendations are included in this Plan.
4. Twelve counties are listed as being allowed to import and export waste from Bay County. These are the same twelve counties that were named in the previous Plan. This Plan includes a limitation on the amount of waste that may be exported to Saginaw County, per that County's request.
5. This Plan is written using the template suggested by the Department of Environmental Quality. As such, the Plan only includes necessary items to complete the template. This is in the interest in keeping the county's approach simple and easy to implement.

Order of Business

Call to Order - Meeting called to order by Richard Byrne at 6:00 p.m. and roll call was taken by Sue Hewitt.

Solid Waste Plan Update Summary - Valerie Keib reviewed a handout (Attachment #1) which summarized the primary differences between this and previous Bay County Solid Waste Management Update plans.

Public Comment - The following public comments were received:

Sharon Stalsberg, Pinconning Township

1) 67% of the municipalities have to approve the Solid Waste Update plan. When will this happen?

Valerie Keib stated that public comment period is open through April 21, 1999. After that time, comments will be reviewed by the Solid Waste Update Committee and then the plan will be sent out for approval by the Board of Commissioners once they have approved the plan. This is the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality required process.

2) According to a reciprocal agreement, Bay County could receive 342 tons/day of solid waste from Saginaw County. Who is going to police this to make sure not more than 342 tons/day is received?

Cindy Winland stated that Saginaw County would be responsible for keeping track of the amount of solid waste sent to Bay County. The information Ms. Stalsberg is reviewing is a suggested formula sent by Saginaw County to Bay County. It was received today and is being distributed at this meeting.

3) There is concern regarding the proposal of a tipping fee (page III-33). The tipping fee should either be taken out or designate what the fee would be used for.

Valerie Keib stated that on page III-33 at least one of the three options had to be checked. No monetary amount for the tipping fee can be named. An ordinance would have to be passed to approve an amount. No tipping fee is included in the Plan; however, the language allows any municipality or the county to pass an ordinance that would enact a tipping fee (or regulate other aspects of solid waste noted on page III-33) without the added step of amending the Solid Waste Plan. No ordinance will be enacted through the plan itself. Any ordinance would have to go through the normal legal process before it was enacted. Because no fee is proposed, no specific designations or restrictions can be stated in the plan. Any such restrictions would need to be brought up in drafting an ordinance at some future date. If this language is deleted, any proposed future ordinance on tipping fees will require an amendment to the Solid Waste Plan also. By leaving the language in the Plan, there will be more flexibility in the future on this issue. Bay County has no plans to enact a tipping fee.

William Tacey, Hampton Township

1) A letter was sent to Valerie Keib from William Tacey regarding some noted errors in regard to the Hampton Township transfer station section in the draft of the Solid Waste Update plan that was sent to the townships for comments (Attachment #2)

The letter was received, and corrections to the plan will be made.

2) There is also concern regarding the wording of a proposal tipping fee (page III-33).

Mark Harnden, William Township

1) Why weren't recycling facilities addressed under the plan?

Cindy Winland stated that the 641 Rules only regulate solid waste going to landfills, and does not have any control over recycling materials.

Mary Kusterer

1) If there is a tipping fee enacted, the money should be used regarding solid waste and not used to toward the Ice Arena, etc... On page III-33, she is opposed to the working "...including but not limited to..."

Dear Ms. Keib:

I have received a copy of the draft Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan Update (Plan). I will address our comments in the same order as the topics appear in the Plan. In my opinion, the following areas of the County's Plan may be of cause for concern and may require revision or additional information.

1) On page II-3 under DATA BASE-SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL AREAS, the only type of solid waste disposal areas listed are landfills. Other solid waste disposal areas would include transfer facilities, incinerators and processing plants. If the County currently uses such solid waste disposal areas, they should be listed in the Plan.

2) There was no description of current and projected centers of solid waste generation, including industrial waste for five- and ten-year periods within the LAND DEVELOPMENT section of the data base on page II-16. Please add this information. Page II-16 was also duplicated on the following page. Please remove this page.

3) On page II-17, under SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT ALTERNATIVES, there was no evaluation for each alternative for the following management components; waste reduction, pollution prevention, resource conservation, resource recovery, volume reduction, sanitary landfill, collection processes and transportation, ultimate disposal area uses, institutional arrangements and recycling and composting programs. The evaluation criteria are outlined in Rule 711(d) of the Part 115 Administrative Rules. Please summarize Bay County's evaluation of the components listed above.

4) On page III-1, under SELECTED SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM, there was no information provided describing the selected system. Please provide this information.

5) On page III-2 and III-4, under IMPORT AUTHORIZATION (Table 1-A) and EXPORT AUTHORIZATION (Table 2-A), information was only placed in the first two columns. To the degree possible, please fill in the columns labeled facility name, authorized daily quantity, authorized annual quantity and authorized conditions.

6) On page III-17, the techniques described on this page are not VOLUME REDUCTION TECHNIQUES, but instead are recycling and composting programs. Volume reduction involves the use of a process to reduce the physical size of the waste. Compaction is a commonly used technique, as is incineration. Other methods, such as shredding could also be used to reduce the waste volume. It is that type of process that should be listed on this page.

7) On page III-14 under FACILITY DESCRIPTION for Hampton Township Transfer Station, the final disposal site and location for incinerator ash or transfer station wastes was not listed. Please provide this information.

8) On page III-31 under SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT COMPONENTS, there was no identification of the management responsibilities and institutional arrangements necessary for the implementation of the Selected Waste Management System. Please provide this information.

9) Pages III-30 and III-34 indicate that Bay County has greater than 10 years capacity. However, no demonstration was provided to show that this is so. This should be demonstrated in the Plan.

10) On page A-7 under EVALUATION SUMMARY OF THE SELECTED SYSTEM there was no evaluation summary written. Please provide this information.

11) On page D-1 under PLAN IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY it is stated that the County will have no direct role in the implementation of the Plan. On page III-32 Bay County Designated Planning Committee is identified as the responsible party for Plan update monitoring, enforcement and educational and informational programs. This information is contradictory and should be clarified to clearly identify the County's role in Plan implementation.

I appreciate the efforts that you have shown in the development of the Plan and the degree that the Plan Format has been utilized. This makes the document much easier to review. I hope that these comments are useful to Bay County as you attempt to develop an approvable Plan. If you have any further questions or comments, please feel free to contact me.

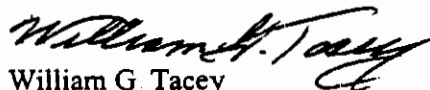

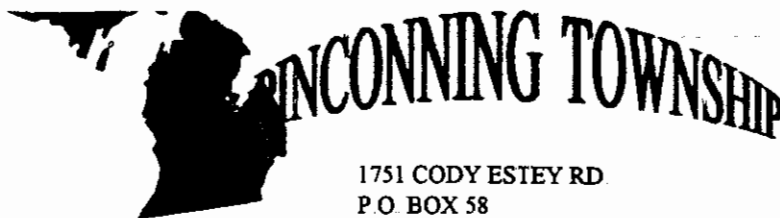

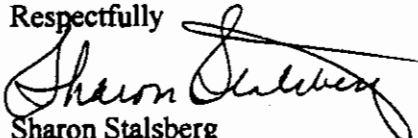
In reviewing the Bay County proposed Solid Waste Plan, we are concerned with number 3 on page III-33 of the plan. As the host community of the Whitefeather landfill sited in our township, we are knowledgeable of past history on the solid waste issues in Bay County. We oppose the language in number 3 (bold type), page III-33:

We believe nominal county impact fees, designated specifically for enforcement, implementation and/or update of the plan could be justified if allocated precisely for these purposes. In the past Bay County Commissioners, on advice from their legal council, have refused to write reciprocal agreements with other counties included in the plan and have consistently stated their adamant desire to distance themselves from any type of enforcement and implementation. This intent is reiterated on page D-1, second paragraph.

Regulations included in the plan are covered by Pinconning Township Ordinance # 14-A, B and C. The enforcement is currently being done by the township. If a tipping fee is imposed on the one landfill operating in Bay County while Bay County trash is being exported out to other landfills, it may create a hardship on the owners of Whitefeather Development and the possibility for lower trash pickup contracts in the future may be negatively impacted and such tipping fees could become a future incentive for siting additional solid waste landfills and/or incinerators within the county.

To summarize; number 3 (bold type) on page III-33 should reflect only a nominal fee limited to implement all aspects of the Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan to justify such action, or the entire paragraph should be eliminated.

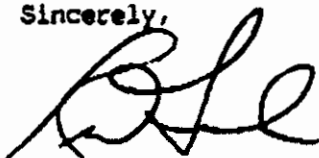

In reviewing the proposed solid waste management plan date 1/7/99, the Township Board of the Charter Township of Monitor has some questions and potential concerns related to number "3" on page III-33 of the plan.

The proposed impact or "tipping" fees may or may not be valid, however we would want to know precisely where these funds would be earmarked. Specifically if the county shall incur extra costs related to the adoption of this plan and the fees are meant to defray those specific costs, this may be a valid avenue; however if this cost relationship cannot be established we, the Township Board would object to any fees collected by the county related to this plan.

In reading page D-1 paragraph 2 of the plan, the county does not expect to take on any responsibility in implementing this plan. If this is indeed the case there is NO justification for the collection of any fee, tax, or any other income from the implementation of the terms of this plan.

We would prefer that the questionable paragraph be removed, and that if there are any fees collected in connection with the implementation of this plan, that there be a direct relationship to the actual costs of such implementation.

Dear Ms. Keib and Committee Members:

After reviewing the proposed Bay County Solid Waste Plan, we are not in favor on the language in number 3 on page III-33.

It is our belief that nominal county impact fees, designated specifically for enforcement, implementation and/or update of the plan could be justified if the fees were allocated precisely for these purposes. Following their legal councils advice, the Bay County Commission have refused to write reciprocal agreements with other counties included in the plan. They have consistently distanced themselves from any implementation and enforcement.

If a tipping fee is imposed on the one landfill operating in Bay County while Bay County trash is being exported out to other landfills, a hardship may be created for the landfill owners. The possibility of lower trash pickup contacts in the future may be impacted and such tipping fees could become a future incentive for siting additional solid waste landfills and/or incinerators within Bay County.

It is our opinion that number 3 on page III-33 either be entirely eliminated or should reflect only a nominal fee limited to implement all aspects of the Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan.

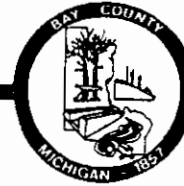

Order of Business

Call to Order - Meeting called to order by Richard Byrne at 3:00 p.m. and roll call was taken by Sue Hewitt

Approval of Minutes - Meeting minutes from March 2, 1999 were reviewed. Larry Fairchild moved to accept the minutes as written with support from Leo Rokosz. Motion carried.

Solid Waste Plan Update Review - Valerie Keib and Cindy Winland discussed with the committee members and Township officials comments that have been received from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) regarding the Bay County Solid Waste Update Plan. (Attachment #1) The MDEQ is requesting more detail and clarification regarding certain sections of the plan.

Cindy Winland will review the MDEQ questions, and will submit responses to committee members to review prior to the next meeting. She will also review the responses with the MDEQ to make sure the answers are satisfying their questions.

Mary Kusterer moved to have Cindy Winland respond to questions raised by the MDEQ regarding the Bay County Solid Waste Update Plan. Judy Barber second the motion. The motion carried.

Round table

Larry Fairchild - *How can the county not have a role in the Plan, if it is a Bay County Plan?*
The County is being the lead in putting together the Plan, but the municipalities will be responsible for implementing the Plan. The County will not be responsible for implementing the Plan.

Leo Rokosz - Brought up discussion regarding the wording in **bold print** on page III-33 regarding tipping fees. Leo asked why the wording had to be in the Plan since so many Townships are opposing it. Cindy Winland explained that if the wording on tipping fees is not listed now, the Bay County Solid Waste Plan would have to be amended in the future in order to add it.

Leo Rokosz moved to delete the wording in **bold print** regarding tipping fees. The sentence reads, "*Bay County may enact an ordinance to establish a tipping fee on solid waste disposed of in Bay County for the purposes of implementing and operating the responsibilities of the Designated Planning Agency, as appointed by the Bay County Board of Commissioners, including but not limited to all aspect of the Solid Waste Management Plan.*" The motion was seconded and carried.

Mary Kusterer - Moved to change the word "require" to "encourage" on page II-18, first full paragraph, in the following sentence. "*The fourth alternative is to maintain the current solid waste collection system but **require** co-collection of trash and recyclables for all household that subscribe to trash collection.*"

Mary Kusterer moved to change the word with support from Dale Johnson. The motion carried.

On page III-13, Mary commented that the acres listed for Brent Run Landfill's total property size and total area sited for use were transposed. These numbers will be corrected.

Dale Johnson - *Is the Bay County Solid Waste Update Committee responsible for enforcement of the Plan?* Valerie Keib responded that the MDEQ will be responsible for enforcement of the Plan.

Public Comment - The following public comment was received:

Mark Harnden (Williams Twp) - Asked if the public comment period ended April 21st or April 29th. Cindy Winland stated that the public comment period ended April 21st.

Next Meeting

The next meeting of the Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan Update Committee will be held on Thursday, May 20, 1999 at 3:00 p.m. in the Bay County Building.

Any committee member who is not able to attend a meeting should call Valerie Keib at 895-4135 prior to the meeting.

Meeting Adjourned

The motion to adjourn the meeting was approved. The meeting was adjourned at 3:45 p.m.

Requests removal of this paragraph. If any fees are collected as a result of the plan, they should be in a direct relationship to the actual costs of such implementation. This is stated by Pinconning, Fraser and Monitor Townships.

Pinconning Township further expresses concern that an additional fee in Bay County while the county continues to export solid waste to other counties, the Whitefeather Landfill owners will operate in hardship (no other area counties have a tipping fee, although Saginaw has proposed one). They express concern that fees to haul trash under future contracts with haulers will increase, and that the fee could provide incentive to site additional solid waste landfills and/or incinerators in Bay County.

William Tacey of Hampton Township spoke in general agreement with these points during the Public Hearing.

Page D-1, Paragraph 2

Bay county chooses not to engage in implementation of the plan. Monitor township would therefore find "....no justification for the collection of any fee, tax or any other income from the implementation of the terms of this plan." This is also the opinion of Fraser Township and Pinconning Township.

II MDEQ COMMENTS

Generally speaking, MDEQ feels some **analysis and information** is missing from the plan. This is true for items 1-10. Please refer to the attached correspondence from MDEQ for details on these items.

Items 8 and 11 speak specifically to **identification of the management responsibilities and institutional arrangements necessary for the implementation of the plan**, and the apparent conflict arising from stating that the county will not implement the plan, but will be responsible for monitoring, enforcement and educational and informational programs.

III My comments:

Tipping Fee

Cindy Winland has assembled a summary response to the question on the tipping fee language, as this question has generally arisen throughout the state in review of plans.

Saginaw County intends to recommend a tipping fee of \$0.50/cubic yard. During the planning period, they discussed the fact that no other local counties have tipping fees. By imposing such a fee, the incentive to use the Saginaw County landfills is diminished.

Given the vast mergers in the local solid waste companies, which have resulted in single ownership of most (if not all) of the local landfills, there would be strong incentive to stop use of the Saginaw County landfills and take trash elsewhere. This is because the additional tipping fee cost would outweigh the additional distance traveled for hauling costs.

Saginaw County is under litigation on this matter. If Saginaw County loses the case in court, it is likely that tipping fees (outside of those stated in the law for host communities) will be illegal. If so, no county will have this option available.

If Bay County charged a \$0.50/cubic yard tipping fee, and Whitefeather maintained its current estimated annual disposal volume, approximately \$190,000.00 could be available. Even if this were halved, at \$95,000, this is a significant source of potential funding for implementation, regulation and education regarding solid waste planning in the county. Due to the merger activities; however, it is entirely uncertain whether the past average volume of solid waste disposal will continue, and the issues discussed by the Saginaw County Solid Waste Committee (above) should be considered.

Bay County would have to enact an ordinance to have a tipping fee in any case. There are two ways to enact an ordinance: (1) A proposed ordinance would generally require a two thirds vote of the Board of Commissioners, effective on the date of publication in the local newspapers. Within 50 days, 20% of the electors in the county would have to submit a signed petition to put the matter to a public vote; (2) At least three successive board meetings, with a public notice, public hearing, and public input period would be needed, with a final vote by the board requiring a majority vote of the Board of Commissioners to enact the ordinance.

If the language is deleted from the plan as requested, the county would also have to appoint a new Solid Waste Plan Committee and amend the plan following statutory requirements similar to the process being followed to update the plan at this time. The amended plan would have to allow the county to take such action, and then be approved by the County, MDEQ and a 67% majority of the county municipalities (twelve).

MDEQ issues

I believe that Cindy Winland will have to speak to the points made by the state with regards to any missing analysis or information. In general, these items were not detailed because, as we state in the plan, the existing methods are considered the best methods. We may need to meet again on a revised version before recommending the plan to the Board of Commissioners.

The County has no intention of involving itself in management of solid waste or implementation of the plan. If clarification to the plan is needed, it should specifically

remove any language implying otherwise. The committee members have the ultimate vote on this issue, and if it chooses to designate the county to perform any of these activities, several other items within the plan will need to be addressed, and a funding mechanism will be required. I caution the committee members to consider that the Board of Commissioners must vote to approve the plan, and will not support designation of the county as the responsible agent for these items. Again, I believe that Cindy Winland will be able to provide some recommendations on this issue

I have received a copy of the draft Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan Update (Plan). I will address our comments in the same order as the topics appear in the Plan. In my opinion, the following areas of the County's Plan may be of cause for concern and may require revision or additional information.

- 1) On page II-3, under DATA BASE-SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL AREAS, the only type of solid waste disposal areas listed are landfills. Other solid waste disposal areas would include transfer facilities, incinerators, and processing plants. If the County currently uses such solid waste disposal areas, they should be listed in the Plan.
- 2) There was no description of current and projected centers of solid waste generation, including industrial waste for five and ten year periods, within the LAND DEVELOPMENT section of the data base on page II-16. Please add this information. Page II-16 was also duplicated on the following page. Please remove this page.
- 3) On page II-17, under SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT ALTERNATIVES, there was no evaluation for each alternative for the following management components; waste reduction, pollution prevention, resource conservation, resource recovery, volume reduction, sanitary landfill, collection processes and transportation, ultimate disposal area uses, institutional arrangements, and recycling and composting programs. The evaluation criteria are outlined in Rule 711(d) of the Part 115 Administrative Rules. Please summarize Bay County's evaluation of the components listed above.
- 4) On page III-1, under SELECTED SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM, there was no information provided describing the selected system. Please provide this information.
- 5) On page III-2 and III-4, under IMPORT AUTHORIZATION (Table 1-A) and EXPORT AUTHORIZATION (Table 2-A), information was only placed in the first two columns. To the degree possible, please fill in the columns labeled facility name, authorized daily quantity, authorized annual quantity, and authorized conditions.

6) On page III-17, the techniques described on this page are not VOLUME REDUCTION TECHNIQUES, but instead are recycling and composting programs. Volume reduction involves the use of a process to reduce the physical size of the waste. Compaction is a commonly used technique, as is incineration. Other methods, such as shredding could also be used to reduce the waste volume. It is that type of process that should be listed on this page.

7) On page III-14, under FACILITY DESCRIPTION for Hampton Township Transfer Station, the final disposal site and location for incinerator ash or transfer station wastes was not listed. Please provide this information.

8) On page III-31 under SOLID WASTE MANAGEMENT COMPONENTS, there was no identification of the management responsibilities and institutional arrangements necessary for the implementation of the Selected Waste Management System. Please provide this information.

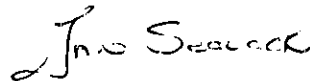
9) Pages III-30 and III-34, indicate that Bay County has greater than 10 years capacity. However, no demonstration was provided to show that this is so. This should be demonstrated in the Plan.

10) On page A-7, under EVALUATION SUMMARY OF THE SELECTED SYSTEM, there was no evaluation summary written. Please provide this information.

11) On page D-1, under PLAN IMPLEMENTATION STRATEGY, it is stated that the County will have no direct role in the implementation of the Plan. On page III-32, Bay County Designated Planning Committee is identified as the responsible party for Plan update monitoring, enforcement and educational, and informational programs. This information is contradictory and should be clarified to clearly identify the County's role in Plan implementation.

I appreciate the efforts that you have shown in the development of the Plan and the degree that the Plan Format has been utilized. This makes the document much easier to review. I hope that these comments are useful to Bay County as you attempt to develop an approvable Plan. If you have any further questions or comments, please feel free to contact me.

At the Finance/Policy Meeting of May 4, 1999, the Bay City Commission took up the issue of considering the proposed, Bay County Solid Waste Plan. In that process, a number of concerns were raised regarding the proposed potential for the imposition of "tipping fees" included within the Draft Plan. With no definitive information on the unit charges to be imposed; no information as to the approximate revenues which might be generated; and no apparent designated use for such funds; the City Commission was left with enough unanswered questions that they felt ill-advised to adopt the Plan as presented.

As a result, the City Commission formally referred the matter back to City staff -- with instructions to request more information from the County on its proposed, Solid Waste Plan and, in particular, on the provision for the imposition of "tipping fees", prior to any final City Commission action on the matter. It is my perception, and that of many of the Commissioners, that the Plan would likely receive approval in the absence of the clause/provision which would allow for the imposition of fees.

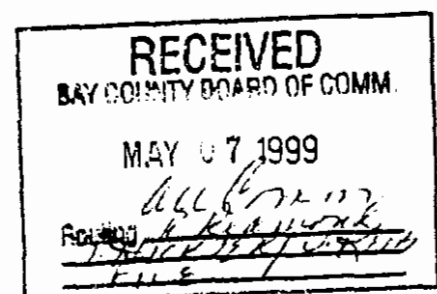

I have reviewed the draft Bay County Solid Waste Plan Update. I find the Bay County Plan to be compatible with the updated plans for the following counties: Arenac, Gladwin, Iosco, Isabella, Ogemaw, Roscommon, and Tuscola. Bay County has been identified for acceptance of solid waste generated within these counties in the "Export Authorization" section of the respective county plans.

The plans for these counties are in various stages of preparation. The Tuscola County Plan has been approved by the County Board, but it has not yet been locally approved by the municipalities. The Gladwin and Ogemaw Plans are out for public review. The others have not yet been released for public review and comment. The Arenac and Roscommon Plans may be released for review in June. The Iosco and Isabella Plans will not be completed for several months.

Please be advised that there may be a problem with the current listing for Clare County in Bay County's Plan. In Table 1-A (page III-2), Clare County is authorized to export solid waste to Bay County for disposal without any special conditions. At this point, Clare County has authorized solid waste exports to Bay County only on a contingency basis.

Also, it is my understanding that the Bay County Plan intends to authorize solid waste exports to Clare County since the plan lists the Northern Oaks Landfill on page III-6 and includes a facility description for this landfill in the following pages. However, Clare County is not identified for acceptance of solid waste from Bay County in Table 2-A (page III-4). At this point, Clare County has authorized solid waste imports from Bay County only on a contingency basis.

The Clare County Solid Waste Plan Update has not yet been released for public review. It is my understanding that the listing of counties that would be authorized to export solid waste to the Northern Oaks facility is still under review and discussion.

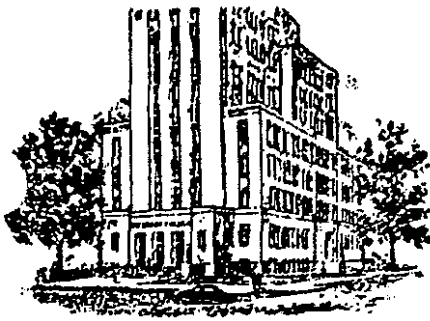

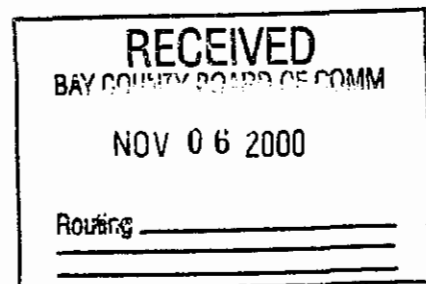

Committee Chair recapped the current status of the Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan. The new owner of Whitefeather Landfill, Republic Waste Services, has asked that an additional twenty-three counties be included in the Bay County Solid Waste Plan. Republic Waste has experienced an approximate 90% decrease in volume at the Whitefeather Landfill. The decrease is the result of an agreement between Republic Waste Services and Waste Management that contracts entered into before the sale of the landfill shall be retained by Waste Management. Many of those contracts will not expire for five to ten years. In order for Republic Waste Services to keep the Whitefeather Landfill open, they are requesting they be permitted to accept waste from twenty-three additional counties to lower operating costs. The twenty-three additional counties include: Charlevoix, Alpena, Antrim, Cheboygan, Crawford, Manistee, Osceola, Lapeer, Grand Travers, Montmorency, Leelanau, Benzie, Oscoda, Wexford, Mecosta, Alcona, Presque Isle, Otsego, Emmet, Kalkaska, Missaukee, Huron, and Clinton.

Since the last meeting, the Bay County Board of Commissioners rescinded the Bay County Solid Waste Management Plan they received earlier, and have sent the plan back to the Solid Waste Management Plan Update Committee for updating.

Meeting Minutes

Minutes from the meeting held on October 18, 2000 were reviewed, and the following comments made:

- 1) John Andrus' absence was excused for the meeting.
- 2) Republic Waste Services is asking for 23 counties, not 24, to be added to the plan. Alcona had been listed twice.
- 3) The committee members who moved and supported the two motions has been reversed between motions.
- 4) On page one, in the third paragraph, delete the words "not an issue concerning this committee," so the sentence reads "It became the consensus of those present that the agreement between Pinconning Township and Republic Waste Services will not be incorporated into this plan."
- 5) On page two, motion one, change the word "inclusion" to "consideration" and change "twenty-four" to "twenty-three."

Judy Barber made a motion, with Steve Essling supporting, that the meeting minutes be approved with the above corrections. Motion passed.

Public Comment

The floor was opened for public comment. John Bukowski, of Portsmouth Township, stated that the current meeting had not been posted in the Bay City Times, and that he is not for adding additional counties to the plan.

Meeting Discussion

A motion was made by Carl Reinke, and supported by Ed Golson, to request that the Bay County Solid Waste Update Plan include the addition of the above listed 23 counties. The floor was opened for discussion.

Sue Boies had several questions regarding the contract between Republic Waste Services and Pinconning Township that were answered by Stephanie Glysson and Cindy Winland.

- 1) *What is the "permitted" area for the next 20 years?*
Permitted is what is approved by the MDEQ and the Solid Waste Board.
- 2) *Wording in the contract could prevent people from stating their opinions regarding future expansions of the landfill, and should be deleted.*
This committee does not have authority to rescind the contract.
- 3) *What does it take to break a 5 year agreement?*
Both sides have to agree
- 4) *Expressed concern that out of state and out of country waste will be put into Whitefeather Landfill and there will not be room for Bay County waste.*
Currently 95% of Bay County solid waste is going to Saginaw and Genesee Counties. Republic's contract with Pinconning states that solid waste from outside the state and country will not be put into the Whitefeather Landfill, that is why there are requesting the additional 23 Michigan counties. Presently, only 8 of the additional 23 counties have Bay County listed in their solid waste plans.

Judy Barber had questions regarding:

- 1) *If Whitefeather Landfill has a 20 year capacity, why is there the need for expansion?*
In case solid waste exceeds expectations.
- 2) *When Republic purchased the 4 landfills from Waste Management, were the contracts also purchased?*
No, Wayne County contracts are the only ones still in place

There was discussion as to whether the Waste Management representative should abstain from voting since the Republic representative did. It was discussed by the committee that since the MDEQ mandated how the committee would be assembled, and that the Waste Management representative would not personally profit, that they would be allowed to vote.

Motion to add the 23 counties to the Solid Waste Plan was voted on by the committee and passed 7-4.

Sue Boies requested that a map of Michigan, with the counties outlined, should be added to the plan. A motion to add the map was made by Leo Rokosz, and supported by Judy Barber. Motion passed.

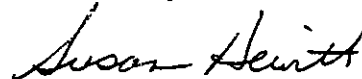

The Bay County Board of Commissioners has approved revisions to the Solid Waste Management Plan which reflects inclusion of 23 counties with whom waste can transfer. No other substantive changes have been made. Housekeeping changes will take place in various areas throughout the Plan to bring it up to date to include changing some of the facility description sheets to reflect new ownership and operating status.

The next step in the process is to submit the revisions to municipalities within Bay County for their consideration. A resolution of approval from 13 units of government is required for the Plan to be approved after which it will be submitted to the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality for their final approval. In the event Bay County does not receive 13 resolutions of local approval, the Plan is submitted to the MDEQ indicating an impasse and requesting that they complete the process.

Attached is a copy of a sample resolution that has been used in other counties for approval of the Plan, along with the Import/export authorization and map outlining counties involved. Kindly submit the resolution to your Board for consideration and notify the Bay County Board of Commissioners of your action within 60 days of date of this letter.

At a Regular meeting of the Kawkawlin Township Board of Trustees, the following preamble and resolution was offered by Beson and supported by McNally.

WHEREAS, the Natural Resources and Environmental Protection Act, 1994 P.A. 451, as amended (NREPA), Part 115, Solid Waste Management, and its Administrative Rules requires that each County in the State of Michigan prepare an updated Solid Waste Management Plan to provide for the disposal of waste generated in that county; and

WHEREAS, Bay County completed their update and released said Plan for municipal approval over a year ago; and

WHEREAS, many changes have taken place within the industry and environmental community since the initial writing of the updated plan; and

WHEREAS, the updated Plan has still not received the necessary 68% approval from all municipalities; and

WHEREAS, the new owner of the Whitefeather Landfill, Republic Services of Michigan is requesting numerous changes to the updated Plan, including the addition of more counties for importation, to make this site a viable asset to the residents of Bay County, to lower the overall operating costs, to keep competition alive and most importantly keep pricing down for those utilizing the facility; and

WHEREAS, without this support, it is anticipated that Republic will have to pass on these increased cost or close the landfill, thus increasing disposal costs and/or leave the County without this disposal option.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Kawkawlin Township Board of Trustees located in Bay County, State of Michigan, hereby expresses its support for the County to rescind the updated plan and make the necessary changes.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Kawkawlin Township Board of Trustees will support language in the Solid Waste Management Plan Update which will increase the number of counties allowed to import as requested, as long as Republic continues to provide long term capacity at the Whitefeather Landfill.

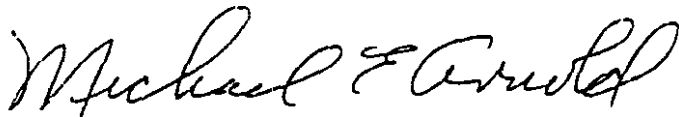

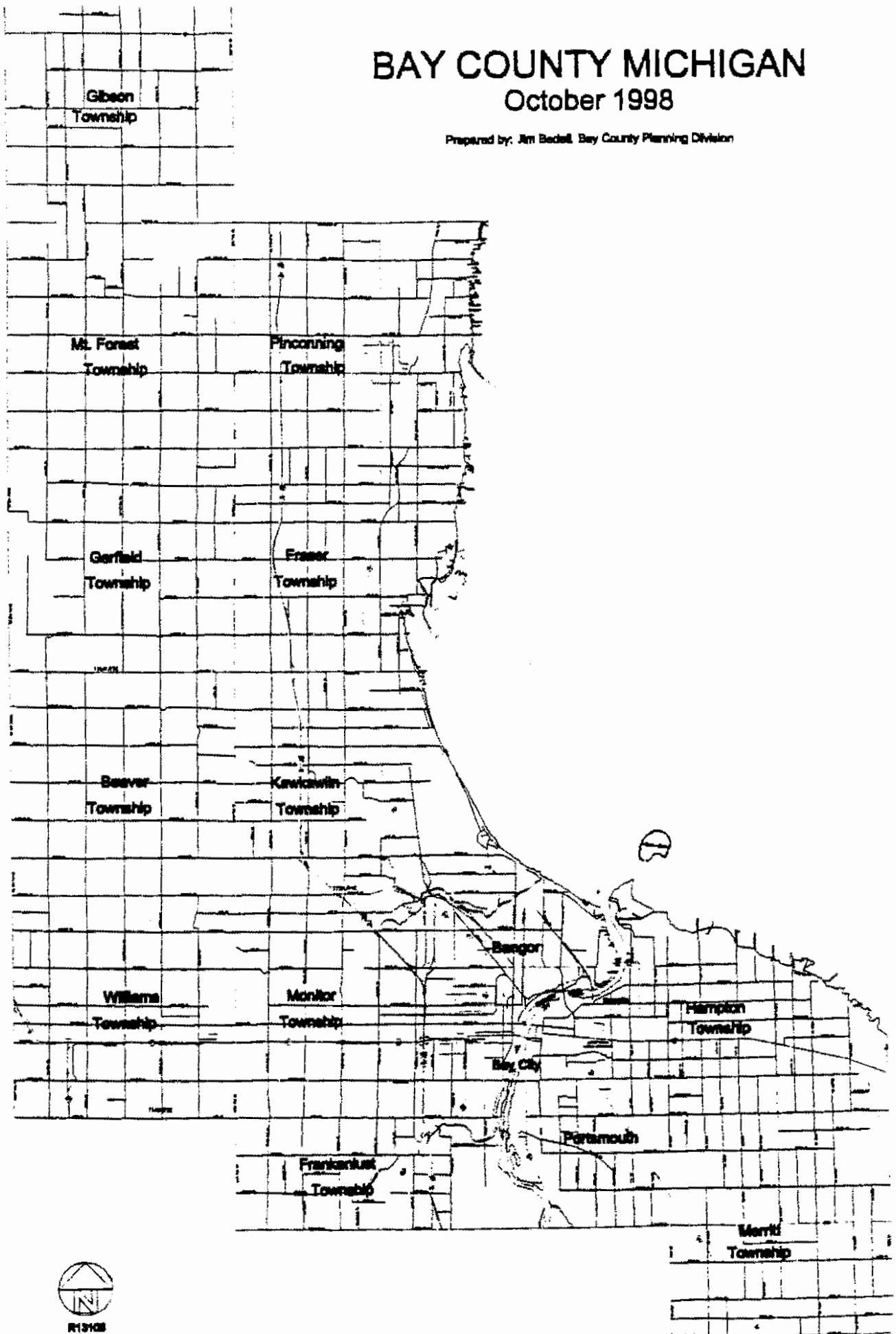

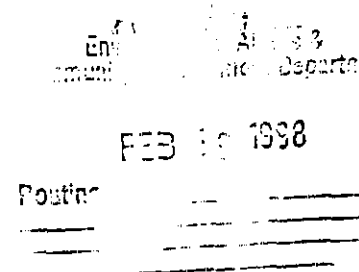

**GENERAL SOLID WASTE
RECIPROCAL AGREEMENT**

This agreement is entered into this 12th day of February, 1998, between the County of Saginaw, 111 South Michigan Avenue, Saginaw, Michigan and the County of Bay, 515 Center Avenue, Bay City, MI 48708.

WHEREAS, Act 641 of 1978, as amended (Act 641) requires that a county in the State of Michigan prepare a solid waste management plan to provide for the disposal of solid waste generated in that county; and

WHEREAS, Act 641 requires that a solid waste disposal area that is located within one county, but serves another county, be identified in the solid waste management plans of both counties; and

WHEREAS, the County of Saginaw and the County of Bay have approved solid waste management plans that provide for reciprocal agreements for waste generated in one county to be disposed of in the other county, and

NOW THEREFORE, the parties agree as follows:

I.

**AMOUNT OF SOLID WASTE
TO BE DISPOSED OF BY BAY COUNTY**

The amount of solid waste generated in Bay County that may be disposed of in Saginaw County disposal areas shall not exceed 343 tons per day, or comparable gate yards per month. All waste must be generated within Bay County.

II.

TERM

The term of this agreement shall be from 2-12-98, through the duration of the approved updated solid waste management plans of both counties, and shall expire upon MDNR approval of a new solid waste management plan in either county.

III.

COMPLIANCE WITH ORDINANCE

Bay County shall comply with all relevant and applicable provisions of the Saginaw County Solid Waste Ordinance, adopted August 17, 1993 and as may be amended during the term of this agreement.

IV.

CHANGES IN RULES, REGULATIONS OR STATUTES

In the event there is a revision of Act 641, any rules or regulations promulgated under Act 641, or any federal or state statutes, rules or regulations which might make this agreement illegal or unenforceable, the parties will review the agreement and make a good faith effort to negotiate those terms necessary to bring the agreement into compliance with

the new state or federal regulations, rules, or statutes. If the parties are unable to agree on the new terms, this agreement may be terminated at the option of either party.

V.

ENTIRE AGREEMENT A REQUIREMENT BY WRITING

It is understood and agreed that this is the entire agreement of the parties and that this agreement supersedes all other agreements and negotiations between the parties relating to the subject matter as well as any previous agreements presently in effect between the parties. Any alterations, amendments, deletions, or waivers of the provisions of this agreement shall be valid only when expressed in writing and duly signed by the parties.

VI.

ASSIGNMENT

Neither party to this agreement shall assign this agreement, or any interest arising from the agreement, without the written consent of the other.

VII.

DEFAULT AND REMEDY

The failure of any party to this agreement to abide by any of the terms, conditions, or requirements expressed in this agreement shall constitute a default if not promptly corrected upon receipt of notice of deficiency or noncompliance and a request for compliance from the other party. In the event of a default by a party, the other party may seek injunctive relief requiring enforcement of the provisions of this agreement or may terminate this agreement.
